Winter weather will soon be upon us whether we like it or not. With that said, we thought that we would provide you with some interesting facts about the season as well as some other general information.

- The first snowfall in the Detroit area occurs around November 16th or 17th.
- Earliest snowfall in the Detroit area took place on October 12, 2006.
- The latest snowfall took place on May 26, 2006.
- Annual snowfall in the area is between 30-60 inches.
- January and February are the snowiest months with 13'-15" of snow.
- The biggest snowfall in the Detroit area took place on April 6, 1886, with 24.5 inches of snow on the ground.
- This winter, expect normal temperatures and normal precipitation.

Weather Definitions

<u>Watch:</u> The National Weather Service issues a watch when conditions are favorable for the development of some type of hazardous weather. When a watch is issued, stay alert to changing weather conditions and listen or watch for later forecasts and/or upgrades to warnings. Watches provide time to prepare for hazardous weather before it occurs.

<u>Warnings:</u> The National Weather Service issues a warning when hazardous weather is imminent or occurring. Take immediate action to



protect yourself, others and property. A warning means that loss of life or damage to property is possible.

<u>Advisory/Special Weather Statement</u>: The National Weather Service issues an advisory or statement for sub-warning hazardous weather.

The Wayne County Lightfest is magical four-mile stretch of Hines Park, displaying nearly 50 animated themed displays and more than 100,000 lights.

The Lightfest is open Wednesday - Sunday from Thursday, November 17, 2022 until Saturday, December 24, 2022 from 6:00 PM - 10:00 PM. The Lightfest is closed Monday and Tuesday evenings.

Very sad to say that our year ended with a sad trend. The support for our Association has gone slowly downward in the last ten years. We notice it in the collection of dues each year. We notice it in the lack of attendance in our monthly meetings. And we've notice it in the lack of total events we put on each year.

We used to do some fun events in years past (picnic, Halloween pumpkin sale and party, kids Christmas party, block party and many others). With lack of chairpersons and volunteers, we have had to cut back on what we offer.

We aren't sure why people feel the association isn't worth \$25 a year or worth taking a little time to help us provide worthy event. Other subdivisions have dues over \$300 and don't offer what we offer for such a small amount of money.

<u>Its not the money brought in that's important!</u> It's the lack of residents supporting their association that hurts the most. We have

506 homes in our sub. Out of the estimated possible 1000+ physical bodies living in homes, we only see 6+ dedicated faces at our virtual meetings. That is 6+ members deciding how

to spend the money we collected from you in our budget. That is 6+ members making decisions and talking about issues and ways to offer our residents events/projects/services that matter.

WHERE ARE YOU? Why won't you at least visit our meeting once (you have 10 opportunities a year) to see what your subdivision is about, what crime issues are happening, what projects we are trying to plan that benefit residents. It can't be easier than turning on your computer, putting the google meet code in the MEET site and joining us at 7PPM for 1 hour. Our meetings are only 1 hour.



I've been in this neighborhood for 65 years and counting. I've seen how it has changed. It is very diverse and we are trying to understand the complexities that come with different religions, nationalities, and languages. We need feedback to understand how to make us relevant. We need your guidance to make it worth your while to exist.

The benefits of living in a neighborhood are great but we all have to participate. Get to know your neighbors. Volunteer and help with old and/or suggest new events that everyone can enjoy. It's a Great Place To Live because of everyone who lives in our subdivision. Take time out to get to know your neighbors and association and let us know how we can make it worth your time and provide value to you.

Hello Neighbors,

Fall is officially upon us! I hope you all are doing well. First, I wanted to share news of some crimes that occurred in the neighborhood since my last newsletter.

In September, we had two cars broken into on different blocks. Sadly, your neighborhood watch team did not hear from the homeowners regarding what was taken or the circumstances surrounding the break-ins, so we do not have more information. The reason your neighborhood watch team is aware of these incidents is due to crime alerts from crimemapping.com, which I strongly encourage everyone to sign up for at their website. In light of these break-ins, I would like to remind everyone to please be vigilant, do not leave valuables out in the open, and lock any vehicles.

The second thing I would like to share is a new scam that you may encounter, particularly as we get close to many holidays. If you receive an email or text from USPS, UPS, or FedEx stating they are unable to deliver your package and that they need you to pay a small amount of money to update your mailing information, this is a scam. If you fail to

recognize the scam and pay the sender of the message, they will have access to whatever form of payment you used and can begin to make fraudulent charges. Remember, no reputable organization will ever ask you to give out your account information via an unsolicited email, text, or phone call. Always go back to the original source company that the messenger claims to be representing and verify with customer service if they require any information from you.

Finally, I still have no update from the Chief of Police about any new staffing assignments or hiring since the crime prevention liaison with DHPD and the Narcotics Unit for the city were discontinued in favor of having more officers on the road. Once I have an update, I will make sure it is published here in the newsletter, on our GMCA Facebook page, and in an email to those on the Neighborhood Watch listserv. To make sure you are made aware of these updates, consider following the GMCA Facebook page and signing up for emails if you have not already. You can send an email to <code>gmcadh1957@wowway.com</code> asking to be added to the Neighborhood Watch listserv to

receive future updates regarding crime, issues impacting the subdivision, and agendas for and links to virtually attend our monthly GMCA

meetings via Google Meet.

As always, thank you all for watching over one another to help keep our neighborhood safe. Don't forget to reach out to your neighbors or the police non-emergency line (313-277-6770) if you notice something concerning in the neighborhood that isn't an active crime. And if you have had any incidents or have needed to call the police, please let me or your Block Captain know so we can keep track of issues in our neighborhood and share with others any immediate concerning incidents.

This is our neighborhood, and it is what we make of it!
